Honors Extended Emanuel Pasquier After 50 Years as Sumner Workman

Last week, Emanuel Pasquier celebrated his 50th anniversary as a Sumner citizen. He came to Sumner from Sumas in 1914, at which time he went as a planer for the Hewitt-Lea-Funk Co., then pioneering sales of "ready cut" home.

In 1920 Hewitt-Lea-Funk Co. sold its plant facilities to Pacific Lumber Agency, and a smaller unit was erected on the present site of Pasquier Panel Products, Inc. Although prefabricated silos was the principal product, it was at the plant that custom fabrication of plywood parts was started

in 1927.

Emanuel Pasquier became superintendent in 1925 and continued in this capacity for the Willard V. Young Co. which purchased the plant in 1933.

In 1952 the plant was purchased by his two sons, Michel and Charles, who now operate the company under its present name.

Mr. Pasquier, who will be 83 on Christmas day, is still working regularly in the machine and tool shop as a master craftsman.

His great skill and knowledge of woodworking has been a great inspiration to his fellow workers and has won the respect of all who have been associated with him.

A party in recognition of 50 years of continuous service was held at the offices of Pasquier Panel Products last Friday, at which time he was presented with a gift certificate covering a two-week trip for two in Hawaii.

Mr. Pasquier and his wife Loretta are now planning to start this trip after the Christmas holidays.
