On February 24th Vicki Conner, Curator and Pam Prasch, Board Member. spent a pleasant afternoon at the Orting Branch of the Pierce County Library.

They didn't go to read books, or browse the latest videos, they went to reach out to community members attending the inaugural event of a new PCL program called "Discover Pierce County's Heritage".

The event brought ten local historical societies and museums together so that each could share it's history with displays, artifacts and photographs. The event was free and it was well attended. At least 134 people visited during the four hour event. The Orting Friends of the Library provided a lunch for the society and museum members.

Vicki, Pam and the Sumner Historical Society shared our free standing presentation on Women in the Military. The table had items from our Daffodil Festival collection along with posters and related items from our Rhubarb Roots collection. There was also a scrapbook with photos and information on the major events the society hosts during the year.







Signs noted our museum hours and open dates. The table offered the society's pamphlet, the Sumner Historical Sites Tour Map plus an assortment of current and past newsletters. Pam and Vicki reported that sharing the valley's history with visitors generated interest in donating family history items to the society.

Based on this event, the Pierce County Library will decide on holding similar events at it's other branches.

Museum opens for the season on April 7th, Daffodil Parade Day



Our first day of the season is also the first day of the Daffodil Parade. We are open at 1 p.m. Visitors will have time to tour the house before the Sumner portion of the parade starts at 2:30.

The museum has an extensive collection of daffodil related items. Some tell the history of the daffodil industry in the valley and why we were once known as the "Daffodil Bulb Capital of the World". The sign proclaiming that still exists, find it on East Main, in the triangle by Windmill Gardens.

Most of the collection is Daffodil Festival regalia along with photographs of past parades and princesses.



New this year is a preparade party put on by the City of Sumner with food trucks, music and more in the parking lot at Main and Ryan. It starts at noon.

1917 Liberty Loan Parade,

The Goddess of Liberty on Main Street







America entered World War One in April, 1917. On Wednesday, October 17, 1917, there was a city wide event in Sumner supporting the Second Liberty Loan Drive, (selling bonds to finance the war effort). The Sumner News Index had two articles and a number of advertisements about the drive. The reporter noted: "The four hundred seventy pupils of the Sumner schools, accompanied by the entire faculty and the mayor of the city, the Red Cross auxiliary and Home Guards and lead by the Sumner band paraded the main thoroughfares Wednesday afternoon in the interests of the Liberty Bond sale."



The article went on to describe the day. The parade finished up on Main Street for the pledge of allegiance by the students, followed with speeches by dignitaries, cheers for all participants and ended with the crowd singing "America".

The following week, the Mayor declared a holiday from noon to 4 p. m. On October 24th, the day appointed by President Wilson as "Liberty Day". (continued on page 4)



The national organizations promoting the drive relied heavily on the volunteer efforts of women who distributed seven million fliers across the nation.

Librarians, in one thousand five hundred libraries, inserted over four million Liberty Loan reminder cards in books.

Montgomery Ward and Sears-Roebuck mailed two million flyers to farm women.

The entry level for bonds in 1917 was \$50. However there was an installment plan, \$4.00 up front and \$2.00 a week for 23 weeks. Note that \$50 In 1917 would be \$1,062 today.

Focus was heavy on schools and educators. At the Sumner event the Mayor proudly announced that every educator in Sumner's schools had bought bonds.

The Sumner educators subscribed to \$1,100 in bonds which today would be \$19,793. One hundred percent participation is very impressive as educators were and still are a chronically underpaid group of public servants. We don't know, but we are sure that many of them proudly wore the button shown above.

By the end of the war there had been four bond drives. There were 24 million households in the country and 20 million people had bought bonds. They raised 17 billion dollars. The Second Drive raised almost four billion.

Two thirds of the war's cost was paid by the bonds, the other third came from taxes.



Sumner participated in all four bond drives in WW1 but we know more about the second drive because someone took time to photograph the event and others took care in preserving the pictures. We thank them, and we thank the local newspaper for providing the details that goes with the pictures. We can record history, but we need to preserve what we record.

Check your attic and cubbies, you may have a piece of Sumner's history that can be shared with future generations. Contact the museum.




